## NEGLECT CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE



## What is neglect?

The persistent failure to meet a child's basic physical and/or psychological needs, likely to result in the serious impairment of the child's health or development.

Neglect may occur during pregnancy as a result of maternal substance abuse.

Once a child is born, neglect may involve a parent or carer failing to:

- provide adequate food, clothing and shelter (including exclusion from home or abandonment)
- protect a child from physical and emotional harm or danger
- ensure adequate supervision (including the use of inadequate care-givers)
- ensure access to appropriate medical care or treatment

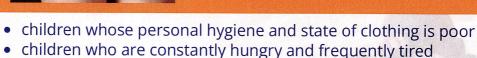
It may also include neglect of, or unresponsiveness to, a child's basic emotional needs.

## **Examples** of neglect



- Parents not providing adequate physical care
- Parents not ensuring proper and timely medical attention
- Adults not providing oversight of children to ensure they are not at risk of danger

Possible indicators of neglect in children and young people



- developmental delay
- low self-esteem
- socially isolated
- poor skin tone and hair tone
- untreated medical problems
- failure to thrive with no medical reason
- poor concentration
- frequent accidents and/or accidental injuries
- eating disorders
- begging and stealing
